'Evidence for a Sustainable Health System'

## Call for Research Project Applications

**Closing Date: 1:00 pm, Monday 8 May 2017**

Expressions of Interest are invited for the eleventh round of the RTP program.

The Research Translation Projects (RTPs) grant program seeks to support high-quality research projects that have the potential to be translated into policy and/or practice in WA Health with the aim of investigating improved efficiencies that can be delivered whilst maintaining or improving patient care. The program was introduced by the former State Health Research Advisory Council (SHRAC) of the Department of Health in 2007.

Projects should address relevant contemporary challenges faced by WA Health, include a solid economic analysis of the predicted benefits and demonstrate a commitment to translation and implementation of research findings in WA.

Applications for projects that may be used as a basis for subsequent grant applications to externally funded programs such as the NHMRC are encouraged, as are applications from persons in the clinical service delivery environment with suitable multidisciplinary and cross-institution collaborations.

Projects may be awarded up to \$270,000 and must be completed within 24 months. Project selection will be based on competitive merit.

**For this round a two-stage application process will apply.**

Expressions of Interest that are short-listed in the first-stage review will be invited to submit a Full Application for the second-stage review.
